Our new staff undergo new staff training before the school year. In addition they are assigned experienced mentors and sent to new teacher/teacher development conferences throughout the year.

Staff Assignment and Certification reports are reviewed annually by the LEA to ensure highly qualified teachers are utilized in all of our classrooms. For the 2023-24 school year, our teachers are certified and highly qualified in those positions. When necessary, teachers who are not appropriately certified are required to pursue certification in their area. A reimbursement plan is in place to encourage and assist them in this pursuit. To determine if disparities are evident in out-of-field teachers, a variety of data is gathered and analyzed including NEE evaluation scores, analyzing local benchmarking data, and utilizing MAP scores to note if scores are significantly lower than those of their peers.

Strengths:
Since we are a school-wide program, all students who need services are able to receive services. We have little mobility and minimal diversity in our student population with a majority of our students coming from families that have spent generations in the district. Student discipline is minimal and we currently have no LEP students. In addition, student attendance rates continue to be higher than state averages.
Weaknesses:
Many of our families do come from a lower socioeconomic background. While this isn't always reflected in our free and reduced lunch percentages (some families are too proud to turn in the form), we understand their experiences both inside and outside of the home are minimal and not often educational. In addition, a lack of diversity and cultural exposure for our students is often noticeable.
Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:
North Harrison has increased our focus at providing opportunities through local organizations that will provide valuable real-world experiences for our students. The educational opportunities are often outside of the classroom, but are no less valuable in ensuring our entire student population has access to experiences and social opportunities that will provide growth and development in those skills and experiences that may not be possible in their home setting.

Strengths:
For the past few years, our Grades 3-6 Math MAP scores have significantly outpaced the State averages, with the the assessments taken during Spring 2022 scoring an average of 19% higher at the Proficient and Advanced levels than the State scores. In addition, results from the 2022 Spring MAP assessment showed our 3rd Graders and 6th Graders easily scoring higher than the State averages, and the 4th Grades scoring 1.4% below the State average.

Weaknesses:

Based on our 2022 Spring MAP assessment, our 5th Graders scored well below the State average, which is a significant area of concern. Only 29.4% of our students scored at the Proficient or Advanced level; however, almost 50% scored at the Basic level and many were not far under the Proficient score cutoff. We are anxiously looking forward to see in our Spring 2023 assessments if those now 6th graders increased their performance.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

While MAP scores continue to score well compared to State averages, we are still falling short of our CSIP Goal of 80% of students scoring at Proficient or Advanced on the MAP or EOC assessments. With a new focus on our ELA program in relation to the Evidence-Based Reading Instruction Grant, additional benchmarking opportunities through the year, especially for our lower grades, will hopefully show continued improvement on state assessments and local data.

Strengths:

Curriculum and instruction meet district and student needs. We have implemented a new reading and phonics program. Teachers received training on new program.

Weaknesses:

Title I funding does not cover all associated expenses. Teachers need to have time to work together to see how reading and phonics program flows from year to year. Students will probably be behind due to COVID-19 closure.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

We need to make sure our teachers implement the new program with fidelity. We need to identify gaps due to closure and address those areas.

Based on the 2021-22 District report card, we continue to have a veteran staff with an average of 13.8 years of teaching experience in the district. 54.1% of our staff have earned a Masters Degree. In addition, the majority of our staff have worked here five or more years, showing their commitment to the district and also enhancing their knowledge of our students and their families. The faculty and staff at North Harrison care about our school, our students, and work hard to help them achieve at their highest potential.

Weaknesses:

Over the next five years, we have a significant portion of our staff who will be retiring. Finding quality candidates in northwest Missouri to replace these veteran teachers is becoming an increasing challenge each year, even as we have taken steps to increase our base salary and increase contributions to our health insurance plans.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

Continuing to retain our quality staff (which is a CSIP goal) while finding qualified candidates when positions open in the future. We understand this is going to become a more challenging need each school year as we move forward.

Our staff is truly a family here at North Harrison; however, that means we sometimes disagree and step on each others toes as family members do. It is a focus of the administration this year to ensure that decision-making is determined by appropriate personnel and that consistent expectations are communicated to our staff.

Indicate needs related to strengths and weaknesses:

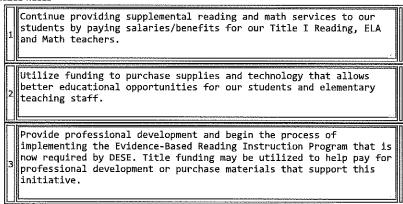
We will continue to provide the appropriate staffing to ensure our smaller class sizes are possible. A focus for this school year is role clarification for all parts of district operation.
